

Alaska Sexual Assault Statistics

- In 2001, 60% of sexual assaults were by friends, acquaintances, intimates or other relative.
- In 2003 there were 931 registered Alaskan sex offenders.
- The rape rate is 2.5 times higher than the national average.
- Child sexual assault is 6 times higher than the national average.

Uniform Crime Data

Number of victims recorded 2005: 538

Forcible rape is defined by the FBI as “the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults and attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are excluded”. This definition of rape is extremely limited, excluding male victims of sexual assault, incidents where physical force was not used, victims raped by family members, and only counting victims of vaginal/penile penetration.

What ANDVSA does: Provides services to victims of sexual assault and domestic violence, offers offender services, adult crisis intervention services, promotes linkage and communication between the programs, facilitates information sharing, secures funding in a cooperative and non-competitive manner. For advocates and programs: training, technical assistance and resource development; staff exchange program; village participation on shelter boards; written audio and visual materials for underserved populations; technical planning programming.
